

From Pastor Gabriel's Desk

Meaningful and True

(spoiler alert—the plot of "The 100" revealed below!)

Some time ago, our family became hooked on a series called "The 100". A neighbour of ours was on the production team of this series and much of it was filmed in Vancouver and Surrey (our impressive library features in it quite often). The series is a story from the sci-fi genre. It tells about a dystopia where earth has become uninhabitable and a whole generation born on a space station await the time and opportunity where a remnant, the so called 100, could return to earth, join the few remaining survivors, and restart civilization. The day comes and we were sucked into all the drama of the 100 returning to a hospitable earth (mainly to the Vancouver region by the looks of it).

Now with our neighbour being involved and Neil Sandilands, one of our favourite South African actors, playing in it, I watched with enthusiasm even though sci-fi is by no means my genre of choice. But after a while I lost interest. I could take only so much acid rain, tribal fighting, and romantic intrigues. My son Steph dropped out with me but Isabel and Marise maintained their enthusiasm and watched through all the seasons while Steph and I played chess upstairs.

I forgot all about the series but yesterday it came to mind again. I asked Marise what happened to The 100 at the end. Here is what she said:

Now this plot sound awfully familiar, doesn't it? It is the theme found in many a story humankind tells and retells for inspiration and hope. See, as human beings we are wired in a way that makes us seek meaning by arranging what happens to us and what our imaginations come up with, in a story. These stories become for us maps of meaning that navigate us through life. You think of your own life not as a set of random events and experiences but as a story that integrate all those events and experiences into a meaningful whole that in turn connects with other stories. The content of our faith isn't really dogma, but it is what we believe to be the story of all stories, the grand story or meta-narrative. And as Christians we believe this story to be the one about Jesus and his love for us.

What makes this story so special? What makes it worth contemplating and celebrating year in and year out for as long as we live? I am glad you asked...

See, there are broadly two kinds of stories. There are stories that contain truth and there are stories that are true. The 100 would be an example of a story that contains truth. Even though it narrates events that did not actually happen and probably never will, it has themes, experiences and symbols that make it relevant to us. These point out and remind us of things that make our own lives meaningful. Things like sacrifice, loyalty, friendship and challenge. These things all show us *what is meaningful*. Then there are stories that are true. They tell us about things that actually happened. They show us *what is possible*.

The best kind of stories are ones that do both. Stories that are *true* and *contain truth*. Stories that show us what is meaningful as well as what is possible. And what makes the story of Jesus such a global, repeated and echoing story is that it is this kind of story *par excellance*. In whom Jesus was and what He did for us, we not only find what is most meaningful but also what is absolutely true and relevant for us. Any story that touch your heart does so because it in some way echoes the truism and the truth of the story of Jesus. Any story that leaves you untouched, leaves you like that in the measure it fails to echo this story.

According to my daughter The 100 end with the leader being left behind with just a sad dog for company as the others depart for another, better earth like planet. She dies (and I assume the dog as well). Is the Jesus story ever better! He raises from the dead and those He loves with Him. They become one body. They share a table of fellowship for all eternity.

What I thank God for this Easter is that I get to serve and share life with people whose lives are the best kind of story. Stories that are both true and full of truth and meaning. Because they echo the best story ever. And because we do that even better together. Jesus's story...is ours. Our story...is His. Hallelujah!

Review of the Annual General Meeting (thanks to Jane Kyle secretary)

Our Annual General Meeting took place Feb.28, 2021 via zoom. The attendees were able to view the Powerpoint presentations as well as vote on motions online. It has been so wonderful during the last year that Facebook and Zoom have allowed us to worship together and stay part of our church community.

Despite Covid, our church has still been able to have a strong presence in Surrey. Over the last year, the sandwich ministry has made nearly 50 000 bagged lunches to support Surrey Urban Mission and Cove services. At Christmas, in place of our yearly community BBQ we added treats, socks and toiletries to the lunches. Our community garden has also not been held back during Covid. Over the fall and winter planning was continued and on March 20, the building of garden boxes started!

During the last year, there has also been a building committee formed whose purpose is to look at options on how the Church can better serve the community. The committee has met several times, discussing options to expand the facilities by building a structure that would offer more space for the Church as well as housing for homeless/low income members of society. Exciting times to come!

COOK'S CORNER

How about treating yourself to a true English crumpet for Easter morning or for Good Friday breakfast? It's surprisingly easy. Yes, the recipe does take yeast but if you purchase the instant kind you simply need to add it to the flour mixture, and the proofing only takes 15-20 minutes. Crumpets can be described as a cross between an English muffin and a pancake, only they have distinguishing holes that allow that luscious butter to melt into.

- 1 cup flour
- 3/4 c plus 1 tbsp warm water
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp white sugar
- 1 tsp baking powder

Yeast Mixture

- 1 tsp yeast (any type will work)
- 1 tbsp warm water (tap water)

Place flour, water and salt in a bowl and whisk for 2 min. (electric beater 1 min.)

Next, dissolve yeast in 1 tbsp warm water in a small bowl. Or if using instant yeast, simply add to flour mixture. Add yeast mixture, sugar and baking powder into bowl then whisk for 30 seconds. Cover with cling wrap or plate, then place in a very warm place for 15-30 minutes until the surface gets nice and foamy. It will increase in volume by 10-15 %.

Cooking Crumpets

Grease 2 or 3 rings with butter (approx.9cm by 3.5" wide but any size works or even a cookie cutter. Personally, my mixture was thick and stayed in a basic circle after pouring-no ring needed). Brush non stick skillet lightly with melted butter, then place rings in the skillet. Turn stove on med-high. Pour 1/4 cup batter into each ring. Cook for 1-1/2 min. Bubbles should start appearing on the surface but not popping yet. Turn heat down to medium and cook for 1 more minute. Some bubbles should pop around the edges. Turn heat down to medium low, cook for a further 2-1/2 to 4 min., until the surface is set and its clear there will be no more bubbles popping. At this stage you can help the final bubbles pop with a skewer. Remove rings and cook reverse side very briefly for a blush of colour. Works great if popped into the toaster the next day or is fantastic buttered with jam while warm. Makes roughly 6 crumpets. Enjoy!



Please pray......

Please read the following which is roughly transcribed through Pastor Severine from the African Church. This special family needs all of our prayers.

There is a refugee family of six that reside in a camp in Rwanda far away from their home due to a dire and dangerous situation. Many of the details cannot be published due to the need for protection for the family. The father is not with the family either because of the unique situation they are in. As Pastor Severine says "...the only way to save this family from insecurity and traumatism is to find them an asylum in another country where they can finally meet again and reunite as a family". As a result, Faithful Spiritual Pentecostal Church, who meet in our building, are trying to get the family to Canada. We are applying to bring them in through the PCC immigration / refugee ministry. The Faithful Spiritual Pentecostal Church is paying for the application, but the PCC head office treats the application as if they are our people. We are proud to stand with our brothers and sisters. We pray for safety for the family, as the camp is traumatizing for them, for togetherness and for an expeditious transfer out of the camp and to safety in Canada.

No Accident

Read this quote from the first sermon ever peached about the cross and see if you can find the revealing phrase

"Men of Israel, listen to this; Jesus of Nazareth was a man accredited by God to you by miracles, wonders and signs, which God did among you through Him, as you yourselves know. This man was handed over to you by God's set purpose and foreknowledge: and you, with the help of wicked men, put Him to death by nailing Him to the cross."

Did you see it? It's the solemn phrase in the paragraph. It's the statement that rings of courage, the one with roots that extend back to eternity. It is the phrase which, perhaps as much as any in the Bible, describes the real price God paid to adopt you.

Which phrase? "God's set purpose and foreknowledge." The Revised Standard Version translates the phrase, "The definite plan and foreknowledge of God." Today's English Version translates the phrase, "In accordance with His own plan." Regardless of how you phrase it, the truth is ever so sobering; the cross was no accident.

Jesus' death was not the result of a panicking, cosmological engineer. The cross wasn't a tragic surprise. Calvary was not a knee-jerk response to world plummeting toward destruction. It wasn't a patch-job or a stop-gap measure. The death of the Son of God was anything but an expected peril.

No, it was part of a plan. It was a calculated choice. "It was the Lord's will to crush Him" (Isaiah 53;10). The cross was drawn into the original blueprints. It was written in the script. The moment the forbidden fruit touched the lips of Eve, the shadow of the cross appeared on the horizon. And between that moment and the moment the man with the mallet placed the spike against the wrist of God, a master plan was fulfilled.

What does it mean? It means Jesus planned his own sacrifice. It means Jesus intentionally planted the tree from which his cross would be carved.

It means he willingly placed the iron ore in the hear of the earth from which the nails would be cast.

It means he voluntarily placed his Judas in the womb of a woman.

It means that Christ was the one who set in motion the political machinery that would send Pilate to Jerusalem.

It also means he didn't have to do it—but He did. It was no accident.
