


From Pastor Gabriel's Desk

Partaking in history

I stumbled upon the writings of the Spanish Philosopher Carlos Ortega. It was like discovering a hidden gem in the desert. Don't worry, I won't unpack his whole philosophy right here. I will give you his big take home idea that resonated with me.

See, we often hear that there is nothing wrong with being ordinary and average. There is no reason to be ashamed if you have an average intelligence, an average income and average skill set. "God must have loved average people, because He seem to have made so many of them!", they say. This all sounds so right but Ortega will shout at you in Spanish that this is dangerous thinking. He would say it is one thing to have an average income, job or skillset but quite another to become one of the masses who don't think for themselves and just go with the flow. He would say even a person with average intelligence can be aware of history and partake in history and if any person does not do that, he or she just becomes part of the masses who mindlessly miss the point and live selfish lives, unaware and unconcerned about the needs and well-being of society and those that come after us. He says this mass-group think vortex could become a kind of "fascism of the majority" that kills lofty ideas, initiatives and does not recognize nor inspire true sacrifice and contributions among people.

His remedy is to become aware of history. For instance the struggles and conflicts and debates that led to your country being formed. Or your family history and the sacrifices of previous generations. The great shifts and movements on the world stage and how it played out where you live and how it affected your family and their outlook on life. This awareness leads you to participate in the history that cries to be written in your own day and age. It frees you from the tyranny of mass group think. It transforms you from somebody to whom history happens into somebody that "happens" to history and steers it in a better direction for all.

Does this all sound a tad ambitious and idealistic to you? Philosophers are prone to

that, but I think Ortega has a point. As I reflect on my four years at City Centre Church, I realize that what Ortega lays out touches on one of the reasons my time with you was such a special blessing and a career highlight as a pastor. City Centre Church participates in history contextually with the hope of the gospel. Let me explain. In our community currently, drug abuse and addiction related issues are at a historic high. City Centre hosts addiction ministries and offer hope to addicts with ministers and collaboration with partners in the same fight. Housing issues in our area is at a historic high level. City Center explores options as to how our property can help alleviate that and house people. Consumerism is at a historic high level globally. We host Sister's closet where those excluded from the spoils of capitalism

Diana's books


We have an author in our midst! Diana Mohrsen has written two books.

Sister's Closet Happenings

After careful thought, Sister's Closet was moved up a bit from the spring to Family Day in February, thinking that we would attract more people and families who would be available. Boy, were we correct in that assessment! We advertised on Facebook to the community and by the time Sister's Closet opened at 10am, shoppers had already been lined up outside for an hour in the rain. They were eager to shop!

We heard stories of folks who had lost everything in a house fire, and other heartbreaking issues. The coffee area downstairs was a popular place to grab a cup of coffee and a sweet treat. Linda prayed with a few people and others wrote down their prayer requests and left them in the prayer box. By noon, three hours ahead of schedule, the clothing racks were being disassembled and the last bits of clothing boxed up. The last bits of odds and ends that weren't taken, ended up filling only seven small boxes. They were picked up by another non profit Clothes2U, who were able to use them in their ministry. It was an overwhelming success, and speaks to the deep need in our community.

Spring has Sprung

It's that time again to do a bit of spring cleaning. Get those windows shining again and tackle those little annoying areas around the house.

- 1) Have any water stains? Wipe a bit of mayonnaise on the surface with a damp cloth. Salt and olive oil also work.
- 2) How about that blender with its sharp but not so clean blades? Pour some soap and water in the blender container then blend on high. Allow to run for 30 seconds, then rinse with fresh water.
- 3) Pet fur everywhere? Simply put on a rubber glove and rub along the surface of your furniture and the hair will stick to the glove and not your couch.
- 4) A few scratches on your hardwood floor? Try buffing it with a walnut in its shell. Rub it back and forth for roughly 30 seconds and leave for two to three minutes while the oil from the nut seeps into the wood.

Afterwards, simply polish with a soft microfibre cloth.

- 5) Overcooked grime on your frypan? Pour in some water and sprinkle with baking soda. Put the pan on low for 10-15 minutes and the grime should come off easily.
- 6) Have some smelly laundry? Pour vinegar and water in your washing machine instead of detergent and let it wash. As a rule, vinegar removes odours such as paint or smoke in the air as well. Simply put a bowl of vinegar in the affected room for a day or so.

DIY Cleaning Caddy



DIY cleaning solutions

Streak free mirrors and windows on your to do list this spring? Here is a simple solution you can make yourself, that is cheaper than a traditional bottled spray.

- 1 1/2 cups water
- 1 1/2 tbsp white vinegar
- 3 drops peppermint essential oil (optional)
- 1 1/2 tbsp rubbing alcohol

Some say that cleaning with newspaper (not the shiny kind) or a coffee filter will help for streak free and dust free results as well.

Keep those used toothbrushes! They are ideal for cleaning close spaces such as window sills and the grout between the tiles.

Also keep those milk jugs, and cartons. Milk cartons are great for planting seeds in (cut them so they are smaller) and the jugs are good to use as scoops for dog food etc. Just cut the jug in half or a third keeping the handle intact to make a handy scoop.

COOK'S CORNER

In honour of the Snymans, we will feature a South African dish, one that Isabel introduced to us. This one is a deep dish casserole made with ground lamb or beef, herbs, spices, curry powder, some chutney and a eggy custard on top. Its origins are from Indonesia where a similar dish is called babotok. It was taken to South Africa in and around the 16th century by the Indonesians that transported spices to the new country.

It could be described as a very well balanced flavoured meal. It has sweetness, good strong spices (but not hot), sourish from the vinegar and salty from the meat. Delicious! In most South African restaurants it is traditionally served with vegetables and is a popular dish featured as a centerpiece of most festive meals. It makes a fairly large recipe, so it can be halved.

Bobotie

Ingredients

- 2 lbs ground beef
- 3 eggs
- 2 tbsp curry powder
- 2 tsp salt
- 1 tbsp turmeric
- 1/3 cup almonds
- 2 tsp butter
- 1 1/2 c milk
- 8 bay leaves (don't skimp)
- 3 garlic cloves
- 2 medium onions, chopped
- 1/3 cup raisins
- 1 tbsp apricot jam
- 2 tbsp chutney (nearly any kind)
- 1 tsp lemon juice
- 1 tbsp Worcestershire sauce
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 5 tsp vinegar
- 2 slices brown bread

Bobotie

Instructions

Preheat oven to 375 F. Break up all the bread and soak in the milk. Heat oil and butter in a pan, and fry the onion and garlic, until tender and transparent. Add the curry powder and apricot jam or jelly and mix well. Add the chutney, vinegar, lemon juice, Worcestershire sauce and HALF the turmeric.

Press the milk from the bread, keeping the milk. Add the bread to the mixture in the pan and mix in well. Break up the lumps. Add the ground beef, raisins, splintered almonds and salt. Mix well, and fry over low heat until the meat just starts changing colour. Remove pan from stove and beat one egg and mix into the meat mixture.

Put the mixture into a suitable greased oven dish. Arrange the bay leaves on top, or push in halfway. Beat the two leftover eggs with the rest of the turmeric, and the milk you saved from the bread. Pour this carefully over the bobotie.

Put the whole bobotic dish into a larger dish and pour warm water into the outer dish, to fill it about 2/3s full.

Bake for one hour and serve with rice cooked with raisins. Enjoy!



What's in a Name?

"Jesus Christ is actually a name and a title. The name Jesus is derived from the Greek form of the name Jeshua or Joshua, meaning "Jehovah-Saviour" or "the Lord saves." The title Christ is derived from the Greek word for Messiah (or the Hebrew Mashiach –Daniel 9:26) and means "anointed one." Two offices, king and priest, are involved in the use of the title "Christ". His title affirms Jesus as the promised priest and king of Old Testament prophecies. This affirmation is one of the crucial areas for having a proper understanding about Jesus and Christianity."
